### **Chairman's Chatter**



As I sit writing my first Chairman's Chatter, the sun is shining, the birds are in song and I'm wishing I had paid more attention during my creative writing course. When I was co-opted onto the council a few years ago I have to admit I had little idea about what a parish council did. I think my only experience was watching the antics of the council in the Vicar of Dibley. This memory came back to me earlier in the week when I was asked that very question— what do you do?

The Parish Council is effectively the first tier of local government. It has a responsibility to set the precept which forms part of our council tax. These monies are then used to repair and maintain areas of the village under our control and to allocate grants to organisations and groups within the parish. The Council is also a statutory consultee for all planning applications and we are invited to comment on each one. Areas of the village, notably the roads and footpaths, come under the responsibility of the County Council and in some cases Chorley Borough. As you will be aware these have not been without their issues over recent months.

The ineffectual repairs on New Street several months ago hardly lasted more than a few weeks and left the drains blocked and the adjacent footpaths covered in sticky grit. The Parish Council raised these issues with the county council on behalf of the village and hopefully the road will be repaired shortly. Bluestone Lane has been patched, albeit with similar problems, but we are assured that it will be resurfaced soon. Now the trees have been removed, the short stretch of footpath leading to Stocks Hall has a somewhat daunting drop on one side. Following discussions with Chorley Borough Council, they have agreed to fence this off and make it safe.

As mentioned by Matt in the last newsletter, the Bert's Moss consultation event was well attended and you should have received feedback of the ideas and concerns that were raised. As a first step the Parish Council will be commissioning a topographic survey. This will define the exact boundaries, contours and position of trees and hedgerows creating a detailed map. In order to do this the surveyors will need extensive access to the site which is not possible at present because of the bracken and bramble growth. Having consulted with conservation groups it was decided to flail these overgrown areas in August when the operation will have the least impact on ground nesting birds. In the meantime, a gate will be built in the fence line leading from the Millennium Green to provide access for our lengthsmen to carry out maintenance. The gate will remain locked at present because the area is so overgrown it would not be safe for walkers.

The village was host to the Best Kept Village judges this month who were carrying out a training exercise. We are expecting our formal inspection on an unannounced date in June. As you will have noticed our parish lengthsmen Peter Boardman and John Nicholls have been hard at work tidying up the paths and green areas within the village. Thinking back to when I was a young lad growing up in post war Leeds I can remember the pride people has in the front of their houses – woe betide anyone who did not "dolly" their steps or keep their front hedge trimmed! So you can guess what I'm going to ask. It would be a great help to our lengthsmen if we could all take a critical look at the front of our properties and do what we can to keep them clean and tidy.

Finally some dates for your diary - the very popular Open Gardens Day is back this year on 30th June alongside the Scarecrow Festival that runs over the weekend of 20th & 21st July. Also, the Village Hall Committee would like your views on what facilities you would like the Hall to provide and are planning to hold an Open Day early in October. You will hear more about this in the coming months.

Speed is a critical factor in all road crashes and casualties. Driving is unpredictable and if something unexpected happens on the road ahead – such as a child stepping out from between parked cars – it is a driver's speed that will determine whether they can stop in time and, if they can't stop, how hard they will hit. Reducing and managing traffic speeds is crucial to road safety. Breaking the speed limit or travelling too fast for conditions is recorded as a contributory factor in almost one in four (24%) of fatal crashes in Britain. This is arguably a gross underestimate, because whether or not a vehicle is judged to have been speeding or going too fast for conditions, the fact it was involved in a collision means it was going too fast to have stopped in time. The speed limit is not a target and in some road conditions, including fog and rain, even driving at the speed limit could be too fast. Driving too fast for the conditions is bad driving. Here in Mawdesley we have regular feedback that drivers are driving in excess of the speed limits which increases very alarmingly their stopping distances. Speed limits are there for a reason, even a difference of a few miles per hour can mean the difference between life and death. The risk of death is approximately four times higher when a pedestrian is hit at 40 mph than at 30 mph. How would you feel if you caused a death by speeding and had to live with those consequences for the rest of your life. Please drive carefully, within the speed limit and according to the conditions.

# Himalayan Balsam

Himalayan Balsam (pictured) has become an increasing problem around Mawdesley in recent years, here are a few facts.

- It is an invasive non-native annual plant
- It can grow to 2 1/2m high and it's explosive seed heads can send seeds up to 4m
- It grows in damp areas, river sides and ditches and seeds are washed down stream
- It grows densely, out competing native species, impedes water flow and, when it dies back, it leaves bare banks exposed to erosion
- It is an offence to plant or allow it to grow in the wild, Schedule 9 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act

I have scythed it down in the verges near my home, hopefully not an offence (?) and if it is prevented from setting seed for 2 to 3 years it can be eradicated. Pulling up and 'balsam bashing' prevent seed formation.

I am aware that there are some other members of the public who would like to tackle this problem although I do not know who they are, and I believe that there could be some funding for equipment. However, the problem is bigger than this, education is needed as some think that it is very pretty (which it is!) and insects love it (which they do) but there is a danger that they will fail to pollinate native plants as a result.

I am hoping gauge interest and maybe form a team with the following objectives:

- 1 To have a publicity campaign so that people can both recognise the plant and know how to deal with it, pulling up small areas before it sets seed is enough, larger areas probably need
- 2 A working party/parties. I am sure Mawdesley could rise to the challenge!
- 3 Maybe when the verges are cut any dense areas of balsam could be cut too??
- 4 Any other suggested actions.

A further concern is that the problem is spreading from neighbouring areas, or indeed, being passed from us to them, so it would be helpful to enlist their co-operation too.

Hopefully 'people power' can eradicate this problem here in Mawdesley. If you are interested in joining a group to tackle the problem, please text me on 07936 228400 and I will arrange a meeting.

#### VILLAGES AGAINST HGVS on the Parbold to Rufford Road

The local Parish Councils and West Lancashire councillors have launched a campaign to introduce an enforceable weight restriction which will reduce and legally limit the use of this road by the larger HGVs. The road is already signed as 'UNSUITABLE FOR HGVs' The sign is largely ignored and these country lanes are widely-used by local, national and international HGVs as a short-cut to and from the M6.

We have significant concerns about the dangers to road users and residents as a result of the increasing number of HGVs. Many people reference HGVs travelling at speed near Douglas C of E school, the narrow bends on Lancaster Lane and Chorley Road and into the sharp corners at Hilldale.
